What is the Internet?

The Internet is an international system of connected computer networks. It uses standard *Internet language* to serve billions of users worldwide. The Internet has influenced worldwide communications such as the telephone, television, music and films. This has also given birth to new services. For instance, newspapers and books have been adapted to Website technology and have become available as PDFs or other types of document.

The Internet has also made possible new forms of human interaction, for example through faster messaging, Internet forums and social networking. Online shopping has developed rapidly for major retail businesses, small traders and artists. Business-to-business and other money services on the Internet affect the lives of millions of people and change the course of big industries such as mobile telephone and computer production factories.

The history of the Internet goes back to the 1960s when the United States government, in collaboration with American companies, built strong computer networks. By the 1990s the Internet became a very popular part of modern human life. Since 2011, more than 2 billion people — nearly a third of the Earth's population — have been using various Internet services on the planet.

Passage 2



Space Accidents

The worst space disaster ever, took place on February 15, 1996 in Sichuan, China, when a Long March rocket carrying a telecommunications satellite experienced a fatal

system failure two seconds after takeoff and crashed into a nearby village. The Chinese government reported six deaths and 57 injuries.

The second worst disaster happened in the Soviet Union on October 24, 1960, when an explosion completely destroyed an intercontinental ballistic missile, killing around 120 ground support staff. The Soviet government reported the event much later, in 1989, but it has never announced exactly how many people died in the accident.

One of the worst human-piloted space accidents involved the Space Shuttle *Challenger* which was destroyed in 1986, killing all seven lives on board. The shuttle exploded into hundreds of pieces 73 seconds after taking off from the NASA Space control centre, in Florida, USA.

Another example is the Space Shuttle *Columbia*, which crashed when the landing process went wrong over Texas, USA in 2003, with the loss of all seven astronauts on board.

Passage 3

Rowan Atkinson and Mr. Bean



The English actor, comedian, and screenwriter, Rowan

Sebastian Atkinson, was born on 6 January 1955 in Consett, England. He is best known for his work in the comedy series *Mr. Bean and Blackadder*. Atkinson has been listed in *The Observer* as one of the 50 funniest actors in British comedy and amongst the top 50 comedians ever, in a 2005 poll of fellow comedians.

Atkinson has got a Master's degree in Electrical Engineering from the Queen's College, Oxford. While he was studying at Oxford, Atkinson started writing and performing his first sketches. He first appeared in Oxford live shows at the *Edinburgh Festival Fringe*. Later, he started performing in theatre clubs and comedy shows for BBC Radio 3. He reached success in TV performances such as *Not the Nine O'Clock News* (1979-82), *Blackadder* (1983-89) and *The Thin Blue Line* (1995-96). The very popular series *Blackadder Goes Forth* was set in World War I, but Atkinson reached worldwide fame by writing and starring in the TV comedy series *Mr. Bean* (1990-95).

Atkinson described Mr. Bean as a character that is much like "a child in a man's body". The series of Mr. Bean has enabled his character to secure a place in the popular culture of many countries. His talent for visual comedy has led to Atkinson being labelled "the man with the rubber face".
