It improves your performance in other areas

Fully immersing yourself in a language learning environment means not only learning the basics of that language. It means learning how to communicate in another language with your peers or participating in extracurricular activities in that specific language.

Nowadays, with Facetime, Skype, WhatsApp and Snapchat, face-to-face conversation is often used less and **1. (less / more / worse)** by many people.

Has technology killed our ability to talk face-to-face?

Whistled languages and a world champion whistler
