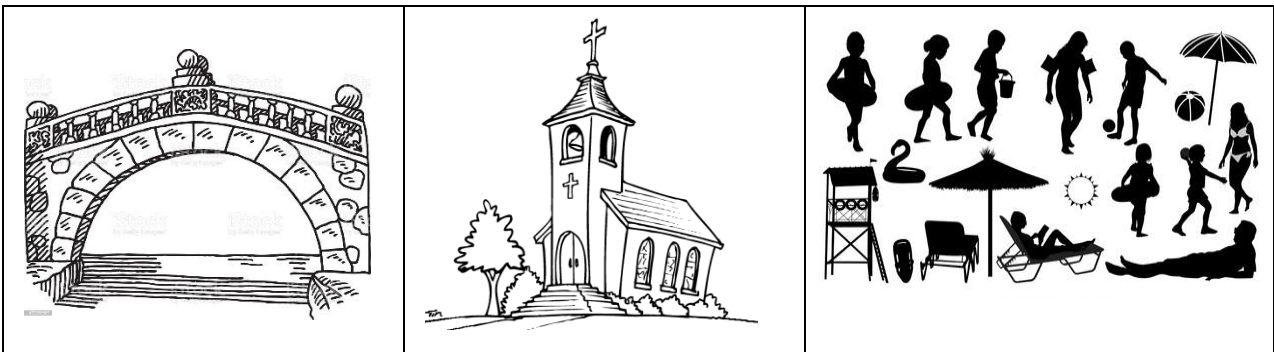

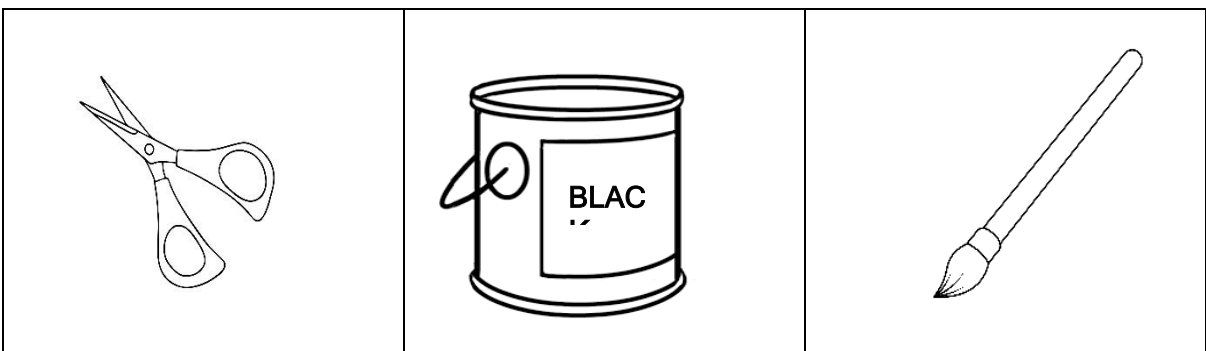

B. Bolsover Castle

Be transported to the lost age of aristocratic luxury! Admire rare wall paintings that have been preserved since the 17th century and the amazing carved fireplaces that decorate the rooms. Hear tales from the past from costumed storytellers and let your imaginations run wild; take the multimedia tour and dive deeper into the castle's history. At the end of the day, relax at the café and try out tasty snacks and dishes prepared in the style of cooking characteristic of the area.

C. Kenilworth Castle

Once one of the country's most frightening medieval fortresses, the castle was later transformed into a spectacular Elizabethan Palace by Robert Dudley in an effort to impress his queen. Adventurers can experience the amazing secret wartime tunnels and those who love nature can wander through the fields that surround the castle. Take a stroll in the unique garden and look out for the marble fountain, which is especially beautiful at night.

D. Dover Castle

Built soon after 1066, this mighty fortress has been the site of fierce battles and was at the centre of the effort to save hundreds of thousands of Allied Troops from the beach of Dunkirk during World War II. Visitors can climb the roof for an amazing view of the countryside meeting the sea, and be shown around by experts who have been doing this work for years.

E. Carisbrooke Castle

Carisbrooke castle has been a fortress, king's prison, and a royal summer residence. See the room where King Charles I was held prisoner in 1646 or climb the high castle walls to experience panoramic views. Have a walk in Princess Beatrice Garden and light a candle at the stunning St. Nichola's Chapel. Last, but not least, don't forget to watch the daily demonstrations of the famous Carisbrooke donkeys working the 16th century waterwheel and learn about their importance to the castle's history.

Guglielmo Marconi – The father of communication



Guglielmo Marconi was an Italian physicist and inventor who was born in 1874 in Bologna, Italy, and died 63 years later in Rome.

Marconi began his experiments when he was barely 20, building on Heinrich Hertz's discovery of radio waves in 1888. His primary interest in the area of physics was the technique and function of electromagnetic waves. During his life he achieved recognition for the invention of the wireless telegraph, or radio (1896) while later on, in 1909, he received the Nobel Prize for Physics, which he shared with another scientist. Following that, he worked on developing the shortwave wireless communication, which is the basis for all modern radios and made the first vertical antenna.

Marconi's 1909 Nobel Prize was an extraordinary surprise for him. In his acceptance speech, he said he "didn't really understand how his invention worked". Nevertheless, Marconi was a visionary who could see the possibilities of a new communication era and tried to achieve his goals with passion and strong willpower.

In 1894, Marconi began experiments at his father's estate where he used basic equipment, to try and send signals from one point of his local area to another. Little by little, he used bigger and bigger antennas to send the signal further and further away, until finally sending it at a distance of over 2.5 km.

However, because he did not find support in his home country, he went to England in 1896, where his work received a warm response. He found help in the face of Sir William Preece, the chief engineer of the post office. With his assistance, he used balloons and kites to send his antennas higher up, and so he was able to send signals up to 15km away. He continued to improve this range until finally British battleships as far as 120 km could communicate with each other. In September of 1918, and after ongoing developments of his techniques and devices, he managed to send a signal from England to Australia over a distance of 15,000 km, setting the base for more modern methods of communication.

Even though at the time he could not even dream about it, Marconi's inventions and studies into waves would help humanity advance and find applications in modern devices such as Bluetooth, Wi-Fi networks, and even the Internet of Things, or 5G as it is its more widespread name. So, the next time you log on to your favourite application to chat with your friends, remember that you owe it to a man from Italy!

The International Energy Agency's (IEA) annual Global Electric Vehicle Outlook 2023 edition has reported that global sales of electric vehicles (EVs) increased by 55 percent in 2022. **(1)** _____ . The report indicates that over 10 million EVs were sold worldwide in 2022, with the majority of sales concentrated in China, Europe, and the United States.

(2) _____. However, Europe and the United States also saw significant growth, with sales increasing by 15 percent and 55 percent respectively in 2022.

Moreover, it is indicated that the increasing demand for EVs is having positive knock-on effects on battery production and supply chains. **(3)** _____. 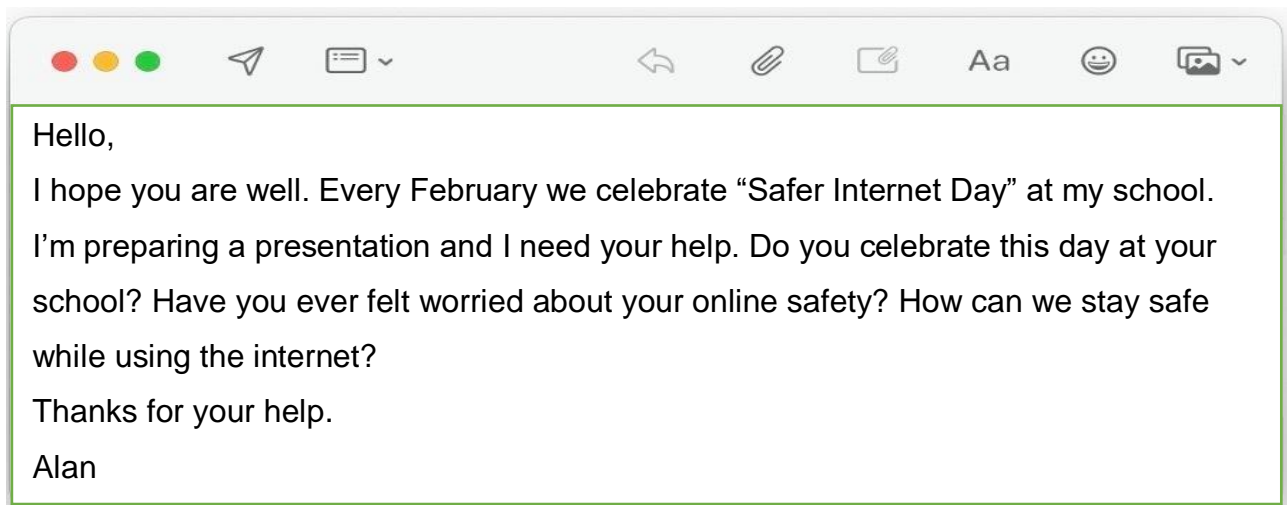
