Dangerous journeys to school

School is a casual ten-minute walk from home, but it was boiling hot yesterday and walking in the heat did not exactly make my day. I wished I had stayed in my comfortable, air-conditioned room, watching TV. I was feeling sorry for myself, complaining about how totally uninteresting and purposeless going to school was, when I came across something that made me feel really stupid. That day we read a magazine article in class about the dangerous journey some Chinese children make to get to school.

You see, here in the US, we take education for granted . We look at it as a chore- something we have to do when we're young. In reality, however, education is the single most valuable gift that a person can be given because it is what makes it possible to overcome barriers. What most people don't realise is that education, especially free public education, is not something widely available around the world.

Don't take it from me, though. Take it from the kids who face extraordinary dangers on a regular basis for a chance at a basic education. Four times a year, 80 children set off on a school run that would make most parents in western countries turn pale- they have to climb 1000ft-high cliffs and cross

freezing rivers to get to class. The children, aged between 6 and 17 years-old, live in Pili, a remote village high up in the mountains that separate China from Tajikistan and Afghanistan. It is a small village, cut off from the rest of the world, which rarely anyone visits. The children living there face a dangerous journey beyond their years. Their school is 120 miles away, 50 miles of which are inaccessible to vehicles and have to be crossed on foot.

The most dangerous part of the route is a path, which narrows to just a few inches wide that has been cut into a cliff face some 1,000ft above the valley beneath. Without safety equipment, the teachers feel anxious and fearful about having to guide their students along. Then there are four freezing rivers to walk across, a 600ft-long zip-line to slide down, and narrow bridges to cross which seem ready to collapse.

Even though these people are desperately poor, they think education is a worthy goal and go to great lengths to achieve it. They are always full of hope and confidence and go about their life without complaining. They just wait patiently for the day when they, too, will benefit from the prosperity enjoyed by people living in other parts of the world.

On any given school day, over 1 billion children around the world head to 1. However, despite the fact that so many children are in school, class. for many of them schooling does not lead to learning. There are many reasons for this. 2. Other children come to school too hungry, sick or exhausted from work or household tasks to benefit from their lessons. The consequences are serious: Around 617 million children and adolescents around the world are unable to read and write. 
