Passage 1

MISSING SAILORS SAVED BY GIANT SOS IN THE SAND



Three Micronesian sailors stranded on an isolated, uninhabited Pacific island have been found alive and well after a rescue team spotted their giant SOS message written into the sand on a beach. In modern terminology, SOS is a distress call that is used to signal a life-threatening situation. The distress call always has absolute priority over all other transmissions.

Australian and US military aircraft found the three men on tiny Pikelot Island, nearly 200km west of where they had set off. Rescuers said they were “in good condition” with no significant injuries. The men had been missing for three days after their seven-metre boat ran out of fuel and strayed in the wrong direction. Authorities in the US territory of Guam raised the alarm on Saturday after the men failed to complete a 42km trip from Poluwat to Pulap atolls, which are ring-shaped islands formed by coral. Australia’s HMAS Canberra was sailing between Australia and Hawaii when it received the call for help.

On Sunday, a helicopter from the Canberra spotted the giant SOS, close to a small makeshift shelter on the beach, and it landed on the tiny island to check the men’s condition and give them food and water. Photos from the scene reveal the men may have used palm leaves to ensure the SOS was visible from the air. An Australian military helicopter later landed on shore with food and water. All three men were in good condition and a Micronesian patrol vessel picked them up.

“I am proud of the response and professionalism of all on board as we fulfil our obligation to contribute to the safety of life at sea wherever we are in the world,” Canberra’s commanding officer Captain Terry Morrison said.

A Micronesian patrol vessel is sailing to the island to pick up the men. The Federated States of Micronesia, in the western Pacific, consist of more than 600 small islands scattered over a massive expanse of ocean. Uninhabited Pikelot Island, less than half a kilometre long, is a low coral atoll, heavily forested and home to a seabird rookery and turtle nesting site.

In October 2016, a couple stranded on the uninhabited Micronesian island of East Fayu for a week were found by the US navy after writing a big SOS in the sand. Later that year,

three men whose boat was overturned in Micronesian waters swam two miles to reach a tiny island, from which they were rescued by the U.S. Coast Guard after writing “HELP” in the sand.

GIRL CYCLES 745 MILES HOME WITH DISABLED FATHER ON BIKE



From her village in east India, 15-year-old Jyoti Kumari reflected on her desperate 745-mile cycle home with her disabled father, a journey that has drawn international praise.

Kumari said that she and her father might have starved if they had stayed in Gurugram, a suburb of New Delhi, with no income amid India’s coronavirus lockdown. Her father, the family’s breadwinner, unable to walk after an accident, had earned a living by driving an auto rickshaw. But with all nonessential travel banned, he found himself among the millions of newly unemployed people. Their landlord demanded rent, which they could not pay, and threatened to evict them, Kumari said. Kumari’s mother and brother-in-law, had left the capital region after the lockdown was imposed on 25 March while Kumari stayed behind to look after her disabled father.

India’s expansive railway system, the country’s lifeline, was closed for passenger services as part of the lockdown. Buses, planes and taxis were also grounded. Being in dire straits, she decided to buy a bicycle and make her way home, which was almost 750 miles away. Kumari pedalled for 10 long days, her father riding on the back of the bike. The

temperature climbed, she was exhausted, and they survived on food and water given by strangers.

“It was a difficult journey,” she said. “The weather was too hot, we had no food or water and I was dead tired. We had no choice, though. I had only one aim in my mind, and that was to reach home.”

For India’s economy, mostly composed of informal-sector jobs, the lockdown has been a devastating blow. The government has been easing restrictions in recent weeks to allow more people to return to work.

Kumari’s journey caught the attention of the Cycling Federation of India. The racing body, which sends teams to the Olympics, has offered to bring her back to New Delhi to train for a “tryout” next month.

Kumari said that while she was happy with the recognition, she had not cycled her father home in pursuit of fame. “It was a decision taken in desperation,” she said.

ARE VIDEO GAMES BAD FOR ME?



Lots of kids love video games. In fact, they like them so much that they might hear something like this from mom or dad: "Enough! Find something else to do!"

It can be good advice, even if you were about to get to the next level. Why? Too much of anything is just too much. It's true that some studies have shown certain video games can improve hand-eye coordination, problem-solving skills, and the mind's ability to process information. But too much video game playing may cause problems.

It's hard to get enough active play and exercise if you're always inside playing video games. And without enough exercise, kids can become overweight. Overdoing video games could also affect other important stuff, like friendships and how well a kid does at school. Besides, kids who play violent video games might act more aggressively and learn the wrong values. Worse still, video games can blur the line between fantasy and reality making it hard for children to deal with real life situations. A study has also shown that playing video games can be addictive and leads to depression and anxiety.

But here's the good news: Playing video games some of the time can be OK. Choose quality games, and limit screen time - which includes TV, computer, smartphone, tablet, and video game time combined - to a reasonable amount.

A good game will be the right one for how old you are. Games are rated like movies and your mom or dad can help figure out which ones you should use. If you can choose one that gets you up and moving, that's even better.

You might challenge your mom, dad - or even your grandma - to swing the bat in a game of baseball or try out some fancy moves in one of the dancing games. Could your grandma be a dancing queen? Time to find out!

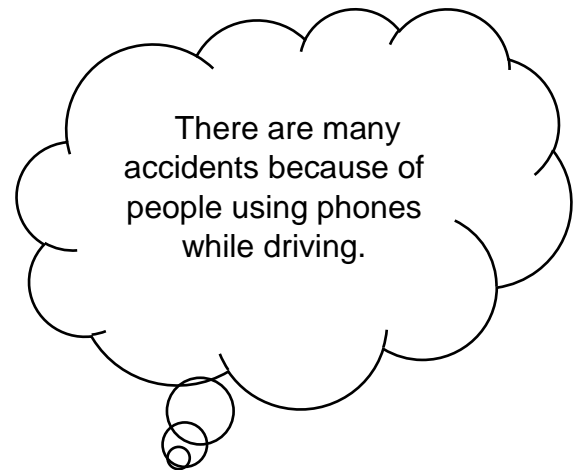
